I. Introduction

At the 70th Session of the United Nations General Assembly in September 2015, member states adopted a new global development agenda, *Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development*. There are 17 development goals for sustainable development set out by the UN. At its heart are 17 Sustainable Development Goal. These goals were launched as a global agenda for addressing the multiplicity of social and environmental challenges that face communities.

All Sustainable development goals (SDGs) are increasingly integrated at all levels in universities, including its overall strategy. Egypt has responded to the 17 SDGs by setting national plan: Egypt 2030 (http://sdsegypt2030.com/?lang=en). The third Pillar of this plan is on: Knowledge, Innovation and Scientific Research. which includes the following group of elements and components:

- General environment: Represents the role of the State in the creation of an environment that encourages innovation, including motivators and constraints, the economic system, policies, legislation, and principles of governance.
- Infrastructure: Play a fundamental role in supporting the cognitive and creative production by setting standards and laying regulatory foundations of innovation and scientific research, supporting business and innovation, protecting copyright, ensuring availability of information, financing and encouraging investment.
- Education and scientific research: Includes all research organizations and institutions, technical education and vocational training institutions, higher education and scientific research institutions, and research centers.
- Industry: Represents all industrial sectors including large, medium, and small scale companies' activities relevant to research and development.
- Intermediaries: Includes the institutions that link between industrial innovation, and research and development on the one hand, with academic and research institutions on the other hand.
- Development needs: Represents the required demand for innovation, knowledge, and scientific research to fulfill economic and social needs.

Pharos University in Alexandria (PUA) is the only private university in Alexandria. Apart from the international research activities, PUA promotes youth development and foresees the empowerment of young generations to be entrepreneurs in a compressive manner. PUA also is concerned more with local issues and collaborate with local NGOs and Schools to contribute to achieving SDGs. There have been several activities regionally and globally that adds to the SDGs that is either lightly covered or not covered in the previous report of 2018-2019

The university recognizes and follows the articles in the national constitution that is relevant to SDGs 2014 <u>https://www.constituteproject.org/constitution/Egypt 2014.pdf</u> regarding achieving social justice and providing means of social independence (Article 8), ensuring equal opportunities for all citizens without discrimination (article 9), ensuring achievement of equality between men and women In all aspects (article 11), including appropriate representation of women, guaranteeing women's right of holding senior management offices in allsectors, and protect women against vioilence and enabling her to strike the balance between family duties and work requiments (article 11). Pharos University also has established an employments' insurance system that follows the social insurance system in a manner that guarantee a decent life (Article 17).

From the point of view of Pharos university, the 17 SDGs can be categorized into 4 categories.

This Goal calls for an end to poverty in all its manifestations by 2030. It also aims to ensure social protection for the poor and vulnerable, increase access to basic services and support people harmed by other economic, social and environmental disasters.

In the academic year 2019-2020, there were 1362 scholarships and tuition fees waiving to both males

and female students compared with 97 scholarships in 2018-2019, in almost all faculties (Table 4). According to private and confidential social assessments carried out for each student, the amount of waiving of fees is determined. It ranged between 10% to 50%.

1.1. Activities:

The faculty of Tourism and Hotel Management organized a humanitarian convoy to deliver blankets to some of the needy families in Abdel Qader District families. This convoy was launched on Tuesday,
17 December 2019 in cooperation with the Social Activities Committee affiliated to the Student

SDG 3 - Good Health

Major progress has been made in improving the health of millions of people, increasing life expectancy, reducing maternal and child mortality, and fighting against leading communicable diseases. Concerted efforts are required to achieve universal health coverage and sustainable financing for health, to address the growing burden of non-communicable diseases, including mental health, and to tackle antimicrobial resistance and determinants of health such as air pollution and inadequate water and sanitation. Pharos University has records in this regard including aid convoys, different health initiatives, conferences and seminars, activities of Pharos university clinics, local national and international cooperation and international research publications. Below is a summary of Pharos University achievements in the health sector.

These clinics include the Comprehensive Care Case (CCC) which is open for students and public. The CCC program started since 2014 under the supervision of the faculty dean and is considered the graduation project of the senior students; where each 2 students work together on a single patient treating him/her from the start till the end under the supervision of the professors of different departments. Through this program, senior students acquire the knowledge, skills, and a widen horizon to make a comprehensive treatment plan for any patient with vision, confidence, and skill. Also this program is contributing in community service for all the disadvantaged patients mainly those who are unable to pay. The actual cost of treatment of each individual case is ranging from a Minimum of 30,000 L.E to a Maximum of 100,000 L.E. but through this program; these patients are receiving an excellent treatment totally Free of charge. SDG 6 clean water and sanitation

Access to water and sanitation are basic human rights and are critical sustainable development challenges. Pharos university in involved in the following activities

6.1. University management Plan for water conservation

Pharos University is implementing a plan for the re-use of water in its premises.

- (a) wastewater and as per the records of the university administration, wastewater from washing rooms, kitchens, and laboratories are collected and channeled to a specialized company to manage the recycling process and get rid of toxic material in a safe way. The university has signed a contracts with specialized companied for collection and treatment of wastewater in a sustainable way. This company was selected based on its environmental portfolio that ensures that water is reused in an environment friendly way. The company responsible to treating water for reuse according to the quality of output, mainly in irrigating street trees in the neighborhood.
- (b) Reuse of water: The university manage a process for rainwater collection and fresh water disposed from air conditions. Both water sources are channeled and sored in a 15m3 water tank for reuse in irrigation of the of landscape, and the play green ground that reach an area of about 35200. This green area has increased since last year where it was 21000m2. With this amount of water, the green areas in Pharos University is expected to increase every year
- (c) Drinking water: Drinking water quality is maintained at the university premises by installing 3 -level filters at the source inlet to purify drinking water before use by university members. The amount of freshwater reuse in the campus has decreased due to the above practices. The current average amount is about 2779 m3 per month.

6.2. Activities

On Tuesday 26 November 2019, the faculty of Engineering organized a symposium on "Safe disposal of sewage water and its impact and environmental protection". The symposium addressed the challenges facing Alexandria governorate and the stages of safe disposal of sewage water and its sources, whether from agricultural drainage, industrial drainage, or human drainage. The symposium also addressed the modern methods currently used to reuse that water and potential extracts such as fertilizers and road asphalt

- On April 2019 through the 17th , and Within the framework of Pharos University's interest in contributing to the achievement of sustainable development goals in education and scientific research, Pharos University had the honor to receive Dr. Fredrik Gröndahl Head of the Department of Sustainable Development and Environmental Science and Engineering at the Royal Institute of Technology in Sweden KTH. The workshop began daily with a general lecture on the general sustainability concepts. The lectures delivered covered topics on climate change, organic pollutants, the development of the concept of sustainability in general, as well as its applications in the field of transportation

12.2. Projects:

- In the context of transferring Pharos University to be a sustainable university, there are several practices for ensuring the disposal of the wastes produced form the university in a sustainable way. The staff of the faulty of applied health sciences technology proposed a project to support sustainability aspects in the university for implementing recycling activities and take advantage of all that can be recycled and transformed from an ineffective product to an effective product as follows. The project took into consideration the following steps 1- Transferring all the amount of water consumption from sewage, laboratories and rainwater drainage to a treatment plant at the university to completely re-use it (zero waste). 2- Recycling of all waste to produce natural fertilizer for use in the cultivation of the university gardens to produce medicinal plants (thyme mint basil flax seed sesame). 3- Recycling of some of the wastes resulting from students' use as packaging and others remains to work in the aesthetic material with the involvement students of the Faculty of Fine as graduation projects .
- The activities of Pharos University on recycling was reflected on the students, and they designed their graduation project on Recycling of Fabrics. The summary of the project is below

12.3. Activities

- The university has a mechanism for handling solid wastes and hazardous substances. This is carried out according to the instructions of the maintenance department at the university and the university technicians. The directory of environmental affairs at the university takes the responsibility of supplying all the material needed for handling the wastes, e.g.. gloves, masks, gowns, as well special safety boxes (red in color), where all the sharp materials are disposed. The experimental animal remains are collected in special bags and placed in a refrigerator till collected. The process of disposal starts by separating the wastes in place, and placing them in the boxes identified till the collection stage and final disposal
- The university has signed two binding contracts with specialized companies to deal with the hazardous wastes includes wastes form labs and clinics. These companies were selected according to their environmental portfolio that ensure sustainability ongoing practices. A copy of these contracts are in Appendix 1
- All the procedures of disposing solid and liquid wastes are registered in the annual Environmental university portfolio that identify the number of employees, the number of faculties and departments, the number of clinics, types of wastes and date production and collection. This portfolio is registered at the university for internal use, and at the governorate of Alexandria for assessments and monitoring. (Appendix 2)

The experimental animal remains are collected in special bags and placed in a refrigerator till collected. The process of disposal starts by separating the wastes in place, and placing them in the boxes identified till the collection stage and final disposal

- The university has signed two binding contracts with specialized companies to deal with the hazardous wastes includes wastes form labs and clinics. These companies were selected according to their environmental portfolio that ensure sustainability ongoing practices. A copy of these contracts are in Appendix 1
- All the procedures of disposing solid and liquid wastes are registered in the annual Environmental university portfolio that identify the number of employees, the number of faculties and departments, the number of clinics, types of wastes and date production and collection. This portfolio is registered at the university for internal use, and at the governorate of Alexandria for assessments and monitoring. (Appendix 2)
